We also received several recognitions for our success in serving students, including being one of 17 colleges and universities to earn the prestigious Seal of Excelencia, granted by Excelencia in Education, the nation's premier authority on efforts to accelerate Latino/a student success in higher education. The Seal is a national certification for institutions that strive to more intentionally serve Latinx students. This builds well on our work to serve all students well and with intentionality.

Rated No. 8 in the U.S. for the upward mobility of our graduates, SFSU remains vitally important to the workforce development and economic success of our region and state. Your contributions makes this possible.

CATCHING UP WITH CAMPUS



SFSU CELEBRATES NEW SCIENCE AND ENGINEERING INNOVATION CENTER WITH DEDICATION CEREMONY

SFSU held a dedication ceremony Jan. 24 for its new Science and Engineering Innovation Center (SEIC), an all-electric science building filled with innovative student-centric teaching spaces. Located prominently on 19th Avenue, the building was constructed with the future in mind, specifically designed to prepare students for various STEM workforces while emphasizing student academic support and sustainability.

The ceremony marked the completion of the new 125,000-square-foot building and renovation of the existing adjacent Science Building. SEIC is home to the College of Science & Engineering's (CoSE) Department of Chemistry & Biochemistry and School of Engineering (SOE), as well as the CoSE dean's office and the College of Professional & Global Education (CPaGE) campus operations on the fifth floor.

"In some ways more important from the local perspective, 80% of our science and engineering alumni live in the Bay Area, 83% stay in California and 8% of the employees in the largest Bay Area biopharma companies are [from] San Francisco State," said SFSU President Lynn Mahoney. "This new center will grow the already significant number of alumni working in the Bay Area STEM industries by preparing our graduates to better compete in these fields."

The college anticipates SEIC will serve all 7,000 CoSE students and thousands of general education

students each year. The building is also open to the University community for seminars, workshops, student activities and more. CoSE Dean Carmen Domingo hopes that the building will be an inclusive space where students can see themselves as future engineers, chemists and scientists. By "putting science on display," SEIC can help demystify what it means to be a scientist — and who can be in these fields.



NEW FIRST-YEAR RESIDENCE HALL OPENS TO STUDENTS ALONG WITH REDUCED RATE HOUSING PROGRAM

Last fall marked the opening of the West Grove Commons, a 751-bed building rising six stories high. An adjacent new building for the Gator Health Center and dining commons will open in 2025. The project is supported by \$116 million from California's Affordable Student Housing Grant Program.

Students also welcomed a new reduced-rate student housing program that also launched last fall. The first program of its kind in the California State University system, it offers housing at approximately 25% less than the traditional rate to students who meet the qualifications to receive a Cal Grant A or B financial aid award.



SFSU EARNS PRESTIGIOUS SEAL OF EXCELENCIA FOR ITS COMMITMENT TO LATINO/A STUDENTS



SFSU has earned the prestigious Seal of Excelencia granted by Excelencia in Education, the nation's premier authority on efforts to accelerate Latino/a student success in higher education. The Seal is a national certification for institutions that strive to more intentionally serve Latino/a students.

SFSU is one of 17 colleges and universities to earn the Seal in 2024. In 2018, Excelencia introduced the Seal to certify trendsetting colleges and universities for their efforts to become learning environments where

Latino/a, and all, students thrive. This year marks the organization's 20th year of service to accelerate Latino/a student success in higher education.

"We are deeply honored to receive the Seal of Excelencia for our steadfast commitment to advancing the talents of Latino/a students," SFSU President Lynn Mahoney said. "Here at SF State, we understand the importance of providing an environment where students' identities are celebrated and represented in their education. Earning the Seal reflects that."

FOUNDATION BOARD HIGHLIGHTS

TWO ACCOMPLISHED DIRECTORS JOIN FOUNDATION BOARD



Tina Herrera has more than 25 years of experience in technology market development and investment management. Since 2014, she has been chief marketing officer and head of investor client services at Sharper Granite LLC, a registered fiduciary. She holds two degrees from UC Berkeley — an MBA from the Haas School of Business and a Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering. She also earned a Master of Science in Engineering from UC Davis and a marketing certificate from Harvard. Herrera has been involved with the YWCA since she was an undergraduate, an experience that shaped her commitment to racial justice and the empowerment of women and girls. She has represented YWCA USA at conferences in the Philippines, Japan, Mexico and elsewhere around the world, including the United Nations Earth Summit in Brazil, the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women and the World Council in Egypt.



Okorie Ramsey has held senior-level accountancy positions at Kaiser Permanente for the past 14 years. He currently serves as vice-president of Sarbanes/Oxley (SOX) at Kaiser, where he oversees and evaluates business risks to help ensure effective internal controls over financial reporting. Ramsey is a certified public accountant (CPA) and certified chartered global management accountant (CGMA). In May 2023, Ramsey was named the first Black male chair of the American Institute of Certified Accountants (AICPA) and the Association of International Certified Professional Accountants. The organizations he now chairs represent 700,000 members in 196 countries and territories. He's also a lifetime member of the National Association of Black Accountants (NABA) and won NABA's Inaugural Core Values Award in 2022. Ramsey is an SFSU alumnus and currently serves on the Dean's Advisory Board at the Lam Family College of Business.

LONGTIME DIRECTOR CAMILLA SMITH GRANTED DIRECTOR EMERITA STATUS



The SFSU Foundation board unanimously voted in early 2024 to grant emerita status to Director **Camilla Smith**, who has served on the Foundation board for more than 10 years. Her service has been crucial to the board's evolution as an impactful philanthropic organization.

Smith is a national and local philanthropic leader. She serves on the board of several organizations throughout the U.S. and Bay Area. Smith first became acquainted with the University when her children attended music lessons on campus years ago. SFSU is a major contributor to the well-being of the entire San Francisco community, she says, and her family has given to the University since 2005. The board is thankful for her longtime partnership and generosity.



UNIVERSITY MEETS \$25 MILLION FUNDRAISING GOAL IN SUPPORT OF STEM PROGRAMS, STUDENTS

The University launched the Catalyze the Future fundraising campaign in 2022 as construction began on the Science and Engineering Innovation Center (SEIC), the new home of SFSU's Chemistry & Biochemistry department and the School of Engineering. The campaign successfully raised \$25 million from private sources. Funds will provide leading-edge research and technology equipment for the new building.

Individual donors — alumni and non-alumni alike — made generous gifts to support SFSU's continued leadership in fueling the region's biotech and tech workforce pipelines. Industry partners such as the Genentech Foundation, Gilead Foundation, Agilent and Keysight were among the generous corporate donors helping outfit SEIC with the cutting-edge research equipment and support for student success initiatives and programming. Additionally, a \$5 million challenge grant from the Wayne and Gladys Valley Foundation was crucial to the campaign's success.

FOUNDATION BOARD IMPACT



BRAVEN CAREER ACCELERATOR PROGRAM OFFICIALLY LAUNCHES AT SFSU TO THOUSANDS OF STUDENTS

SFSU celebrated the official launch of its partnership with the nonprofit Braven at a September kickoff event that brought together a diverse group of stakeholders, including SFSU leaders, faculty and staff and Braven staff. Over the next five years, SFSU and Braven aim to provide 4,400 students with the skills, experiences and networks they need to thrive in their careers. This includes access to mentorship, networking, internship and job opportunities and career development workshops.

A college degree and career preparation are critical to educational equity and upward mobility, SFSU President Lynn Mahoney told the audience at the launch event. “Together, we will empower students and propel them on their path to economic success after graduation,” she said. “Our partnership [with Braven] builds on the widely recognized work of SF State to provide access to world-class academic programs and degree attainment for our students.”

The event underscored the broader impact of investing in students who come from a low-income background, identify as students of color and/or are first-generation students. It also highlighted the collective efforts required to diversify and enrich the talent pipeline in the Bay Area.

“While education can be a great equalizer, only about 30% of the 1.4 million first-generation and low-income students entering college are predicted to land a strong job after graduation,” said Diana

Phuong, Braven’s executive director for the Bay Area. “I am so excited about the partnership with SFSU, and it’s an absolute privilege to now have the opportunity to pay it forward to the next generation of leaders, right here in our backyard, our home.”



SFSU AND SAN FRANCISCO FEDERAL CREDIT UNION TEAM UP TO ENHANCE STUDENT PROGRAMMING AND CAMPUS LIFE

SFSU and San Francisco Federal Credit Union (SFFedCU), a not-for-profit financial cooperative that serves San Francisco and San Mateo counties, teamed up as part of a strategic collaboration to enhance the programs and services offered to students and campus employees.

Through this partnership, SFFedCU will have access to a menu of sponsorship opportunities across various SFSU activities, including programming and events organized by Gator Athletics, the University's athletics arm. Funding from the sponsorship will bolster athletic operations, scholarships and financial education programs for students and employees as well as University fundraising priorities like enhanced career preparedness programming.

"It made perfect sense for us to work with the San Francisco Federal Credit Union, as its core values closely align with ours," SFSU Foundation President Jeff Jackanicz said. "The credit union has a strong commitment to diversity and upward economic mobility and deeply cares about the communities which they serve — values the University also stands by."



Specific ways the partnership will benefit the campus community also include:

- SFFedCU will offer online and in-person financial education programming to complement what the University already offers.
- SFFedCU's Foundation will provide annual support to scholarships, including the Presidential Scholars Program.
- Funding from the sponsorship will also support the University's overall fundraising priorities, such as enhanced career preparation programming for students.

SFSU RECEIVES \$14M FROM THE GENENTECH FOUNDATION TO SUPPORT UNDERREPRESENTED STUDENTS IN STEM

SFSU received \$14 million from the Genentech Foundation in May to support two University programs that are training the next generation of life sciences leaders. The new five-year grant is the latest in the Genentech Foundation's transformational support for University programs, which has totaled more than \$33 million during their partnership. This partnership has impacted more than 700 students since 2008, and an additional 350 students are projected to be supported by the new funding.

The new funds will continue sponsoring SFSU's Genentech Foundation Scholars and PINC (Promoting Inclusivity in Computing) programs. This latest \$14 million grant will extend tuition support to freshmen and sophomores to cover full tuition for all undergraduate students in the Genentech Foundation Scholars Program for the first time. It will also increase support and research opportunities for students in the PINC programs.

Since the Genentech Foundation-SFSU partnership began, the Genentech Foundation Scholars program



has had a tangible impact on diversifying the STEM Ph.D. pipeline and increasing the number of underrepresented students in Ph.D. programs. One hundred and six students — 22 undergraduate and 84 master's students — have enrolled in Ph.D. programs. Thirty-eight students have completed their Ph.D. program, with students from the 2019 grant cohorts still working on their Ph.D. degrees.





SFSU ESTABLISHES HENRI AND TOMOYE TAKAHASHI DISTINGUISHED ENDOWED CHAIR IN NIKKEI STUDIES WITH LANDMARK GIFT

SFSU received a \$4.2 million gift from the Henri and Tomoye Takahashi Charitable Foundation to establish the Henri and Tomoye Takahashi Distinguished Chair in Nikkei Studies. This faculty position is the first endowed chair in the University's College of Ethnic Studies.

Nikkei Studies centers the history, culture and experiences of the global Japanese diaspora and its intersectional communities. The new distinguished endowed chair will focus on increasing awareness, understanding and appreciation of the historical and contemporary experiences of Japanese Americans and the worldwide Nikkei diaspora.


The Distinguished Endowed Chair in Nikkei Studies will join the SFSU faculty in 2025 and will:

- Collaborate and exchange ideas with national and international scholars in Nikkei Studies
- Lead the development of curricula and resources for teaching Nikkei Studies at the University and K-12 school levels nationwide
- Further frameworks of social justice and self-determination in advancing Nikkei Studies
- Promote Nikkei Studies on campus and engage with the Nikkei community in the Bay Area and beyond

Masako Takahashi, a San Francisco-based artist born in Utah's Topaz Concentration Camp during World War II, is the president of the Henri and Tomoye Takahashi Charitable Foundation. "When I attended the University's last Alumni Hall of Fame celebration and heard the honorees speak, it was clear to me that SF State and its graduates show a deep commitment to supporting minorities and the marginalized," Masako Takahashi said. "It made me feel our funding could support a good place, a place for good."



ALUMNA'S HUSBAND BEQUEATHS \$1M TO DEPARTMENT OF HISTORY TO SUPPORT FUTURE EDUCATORS



William Donald Briggs never attended SFSU, but through a generous bequest to the Department of History his impact will be felt by students studying history for years to come. After his passing at the age of 85 in 2021, his niece and estate trustee, Ann Hanna, discovered that her uncle had bequeathed \$1 million to the department to fund scholarships for “worthy and needy students intending to become teachers.” In September, after closing out her uncle’s estate, Ann dispursed the funds to the University.

Briggs never shared what inspired his gift, Hanna says, but she guessed he wanted to honor his late wife Joan Brehm Briggs, who died in 2000. Joan graduated from SF State in 1959 and went on to teach third grade for many years. The couple was married for nearly 30 years, and she was “his whole life,” Hanna says.

“When she passed away, my uncle redid his will,” Hanna said. “He wanted to make sure that San Francisco State was acknowledged as a part of their lives together.” Briggs grew up on a farm near Sacramento, leaving to attend college at the University of California, Los

Angeles. He went on to earn a Ph.D. in history from the University of Michigan, where he taught history for 35 years. He met his future wife there, and they later moved to San Francisco. Briggs had a lifelong love of history. He taught, conducted research and wrote about ancient and modern European history. The Department of History will distribute the funds to needy students, with a preference given to those in the graduate certificate program in History Education.

LETTER FROM THE BOARD SECRETARY/TREASURER



I am pleased to present the financial performance of our endowment for fiscal year 2023 – 2024. The fiscal year was marked by growth to the endowment’s net position, or market value, which was \$179 million, an increase of \$13.8 million or about 8% more than the previous year. Our investments recorded positive investment returns at 8%. What I’m most proud of is that the endowment generated more than \$6 million in support of scholarships, faculty positions, academic programs, research and more.

As a best practice for nonprofit foundations, we recently concluded an RFP for a new investment adviser and, after an extensive vetting process, selected our longtime trusted adviser Cambridge Associates. The investment committee voted to take our relationship with the firm to the next level by transitioning from a traditional investment advisory model to an Outsourced Chief Investment Officer arrangement — reflecting our growth as a Foundation. This model will allow Cambridge Associates to act with greater agility, freeing up the Foundation to focus on more strategic goals.

It’s been five years since the successful conclusion of the BOLD Thinking campaign, the University’s capital campaign that raised more than \$150 million in support of student success. Currently, the University is engaged in a campaign feasibility and readiness study led by CCS Fundraising, a firm of expert consultants in campaign and development strategy. The results will provide us with guidance on how to prepare for our next potential fundraising campaign.

We remain enthusiastic about the continued growth of our endowment. Through your ongoing support, we can ensure a bright future for our students.



TOTAL NET POSITION






